On 31st October 1517, Martin Luther nailed his '95 Theses' to the church door at Wittenberg, Germany, triggering the Protestant Reformation. The 95 Theses set out Luther's theological beliefs (shared by many others) and had at their heart two central beliefs – that the Bible is the central religious authority, and that we may reach salvation only through faith and not through works. Nailing his Theses to the church door

(if that is indeed what he did... there is some debate) was a very public statement by Luther about his faith and his vision for the church.

Of course, when we come together in worship, we make public statements of faith together – notably in the words of the Creed – but there are other times when we may be called to set out our theological beliefs and make public statements of faith.

Over the coming weeks, you begin to see the 'results' (if they can be called that!) of a particular public statement about faith and vision for the church. Perhaps the most obvious of those will be seeing our Curate, Mark Smeed, presiding at Holy Communion services.

Mark was ordained as a deacon last year, and has followed the "usual" pattern of serving for one year as a deacon before being ordained priest. During the service where they are ordained priest, those being ordained make declarations of faith and commit to particular faith practices in the context of their new ministry. It is, of course, a great privilege to make those declarations but the Bishop's words that immediately follow them reflect the enormity of all that priests are called to do and to be:

"Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge that these



ordinands are ready to undertake... Will you continually pray for them? ... Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry?"

Being a priest is both a privilege and a great charge. As he enters this new phase in his ministry, please do pray particularly for Mark and for Angela and their children – Jonah, Elijah and Naomi... Continue to pray too for the others who have a priestly ministry in this parish – for Ken, Marianne, Barbara, Sonia and me; your prayers and encouragement uphold us in this ministry in which – by the grace of God – we are privileged to share.

We Plough the Fields of Hornchurch

It was 21st September as the PCC safely gathered in the items on another agenda. Crops reaped included:

- ♦ No vegetating for our Parish Wardens who are involved in organising and overseeing huge amounts of work in all our buildings. A lot of essential repairs and improvements have surfaced in recent months, and we are also awaiting quotes for St Andrew's roof. To keep all things bright and beautiful is time consuming and expensive and we really appreciate how they tend and cultivate everything.
- ♦ Harvesting our resources. Valuable income results from hiring out our halls but we are conscious of the pressures on our hirers and their clients in these challenging financial times. As a Church we have had to plough our own way through increased costs, and for the last few years we have only increased our hall hire fees by small amounts. After digging over the issues, it was agreed that the 2024 increase would again be very modest, sowing the seeds of God's love in Hornchurch.
- ♦ Financial farming. Our Parish Share Assessment for 2024 is a slight increase on 2023 at £167,250. The Deanery as a whole has to meet an allotted sum, and last year we as a parish elected to pay more than our assessment to help out. Taking all things into account, the PCC decided we must pay the £167,250 but cannot offer any additional amount this time. All good gifts around us are sent from Heaven above and we are challenged how we use them as individuals and a parish.
- ♦ Let us with a gladsome mind celebrate that our Curate, Marianne, has been licenced to stay on at St Andrew's after the completion of her curacy term. She and her family have become much loved members of our church family, and we are delighted they will continue to grow and bloom here.
- ♦ No farmland in Hornchurch anymore but many mission fields to work on. Fed and watered by God, we seek to respond to His abundance with humble thankful hearts.

Bitter Tears

We read in 2 Samuel (II) of King David's desire for Bathsheba, wife of Uriah, one of his commanders in the field of battle. David deliberately placed Uriah in the forefront of the action knowing he would not survive. This would give David the opportunity to take Bathsheba as his lover and later his wife.

David soon realized he had sinned and betrayed his love for God, and urgently sought to seek his forgiveness. He composed a special plea (Psalm 51) for God to hear, begging for absolution and pardon for his sin, and abuse of power and trust. David did not wish to lose the loving association he shared with God, the possibility of which greatly disturbed him. For example, David had written "I know of my transgression and my sin is ever before me" and also "restore me to the joy of Your salvation."

Although God is forever understanding of the wrongful ways and frailty of His people, He is always prepared to forgive, but often there is a price to pay as when we read that the first child born to Bathsheba died. Our atonement may be sincere, even though remorse may serve as a punishment as witnessed here. When I awake my sinful deeds stand before me. Like sentinel guardians they mirror my remorse, and on their reflection, I so with bitter tears weep and regret.

However, King David's psalm says it

Christians in Pakistan recovering after mob attack

how to rebuild their homes and churches in the aftermath of recent attacks on townships in Jaranwala, Punjab, following unsubstantiated allegations of blasphemy Partners of UK-based Rélease International held services out of doors after mobs recently set fire to houses, churches and Bibles. Efforts are underway to galvanise emergency relief aid for the thousands of Christians driven from their homes.

During the attack, thousands of Muslims descended on Jaranwala. Initial estimates said they burned down five churches, damaged 21 others, torched 40 homes of Christians, and attacked more than 100 others.

But a new report by Human Rights Focus Pakistan estimates the damage was more widespread. They say 19 churches were burned, 89 Christian houses were destroyed, and more than 400 homes damaged. The rampage against three Christian

Christians in Pakistan are considering townships in the area followed claims over mosque loudspeakers that torn pages of the Koran had been found in the Christian district. Thousands of protestors armed with sticks were finally restrained by the army. But first they set fire to churches, including the Salvation Army, United Presbyterian Church, Allied Foundation Church, and Saint Paul Catholic Church.

Release International's partner in Pakistan says, 'Thank God there were no injuries or deaths, because after the announcement on the mosque loudspeakers, every Christian managed to flee. They left everything behind to save their lives.

Release International's partner, Reverend Waseem Khokhar visited the aftermath of the attack under the protection of the Punjab police. He said, "We don't have words to describe the terrible destruction of church buildings, and everything in them. All we could see were ashes."







Charity of the Month for October ~ London Air Ambulance Charity

In London the helicopter can reach casualties within 11 minutes and the crew can carry out live-saving surgery at the scene if necessary. Every day there at least 5 people who have need of this vital service.

The helicopters they are currently using have been in service for 20 years and are becoming old and difficult to maintain so need replacing urgently. Their appeal 'Up Against Time' is aiming to raise £15 million by autumn 2024 to replace their whole fleet, (2 helicopters).

The Air Ambulance receives no funding from the NHS or

government. They are funded predominantly by public donations although they are supported by the Barts NHS Trust. The Air Ambulance London is a registered charity in its own right.

This charity has been working tirelessly with the NHS to develop rapid response pre-hospital medicine. The average cost of a patient is £2,290 and the charity has to raise around £10 million each year in order to meet its running costs. Being their own charity allows them flexibility when developing procedures for patient care, as this is a unique and non-sterile environment they are required to work in.

Nuclear Physics: the Hornchurch Connection

Professor Ged Martin, who until 2020 wrote a column in the Romford Recorder on local history, has very kindly allowed Bullseye to reproduce some of his essays about the history of Hornchurch and Havering from his website at https://www.gedmartin.net/martinalia-mainmenu-3.

Martha Thompson was born in Hornchurch in 1842. Hardly the start of an earth-shaking story, you might say — but you'd be wrong. Martha's father, Charles Edwin Thompson, appears in the 1851 census as "Agricultural Machine Maker". Hornchurch had two foundries, manufacturing ploughs and farm equipment. One of them was Wedlake and Thompson's Union Foundry. Its site is now Sainsbury's. In 1851, the family lived somewhere on the south side of Hornchurch High Street. Martha would have known the clang of the hammers and the heat of the furnaces.

The key to Martha's life was education. Maybe she was taught at home by her mother, Caroline, who came from Barking. In 1844, an Anglican primary school opened opposite St Andrew's church, and Martha probably acquired her

enthusiasm for education there. It's moved twice since those days, but its successor is Langton's in Westland Avenue. Disaster struck in 1853, when Charles Edwin died, aged just 34. I've traced no report of a foundry accident. Far too often in those days, people died far too young. Caroline took her brood of children to the rising colony of New Zealand. Martha became a schoolteacher. I doubt if she had any formal teacher training. Her Hornchurch education was her qualification for the classroom. In 1866, in Nelson, she

married James Rutherford. He was a wheelwright, and perhaps reminded her of the foundry. They had ten children, one of whom — Ernest — became famous. James was great at solving practical problems, a skill his son inherited. But his education was poor. He even registered the boy's name as "Earnest", which caused problems in later life.

It was Martha who encouraged her son to study. At the small university in Christchurch, Ernest gained first class honours in maths and science. In 1895, he won a scholarship to Cambridge, where the famous Cavendish Laboratory led the world in scientific research.

Cambridge physicists had discovered that the atom — the basic building



block of the universe — was itself composed of particles. In 1911, Ernest Rutherford suggested that those particles mostly formed a core, which he called the "nucleus". They were like the red snooker balls at the start of the frame. With the right cue ball,

you could release untold energy from the shattered nucleus. The New Zealander became the first scientist to split the atom. He won the Nobel Prize, received the Order of Merit and became Lord Rutherford of Nelson. When he died in 1937, his ashes were buried in Westminster Abbey.

Ernest Rutherford wrote long letters to his mother about his work, and revisited New Zealand four times to see his parents. It seems that Martha never returned to Britain. In the 1890s, a cousin, Darius Thompson, a successful dentist, lived at the Manor House in Squirrels Heath (Manor Avenue at The Drill preserves the name). Perhaps he welcomed the young colonial to England.

No doubt there were people in the Hornchurch of 1850 who scoffed at the idea of educating girls. Women

should learn to clean and cook, not stick their heads in books! But you can never foretell the indirect benefits of education. Martha Thompson's Hornchurch childhood forms part of a world-shaking story.
