

# Thy Kingdom Come

This month millions of Christians worldwide, of every denomination, will once again join in with *Thy Kingdom Come*, a prayer initiative between Ascension and Pentecost (29<sup>th</sup> May to 8<sup>th</sup> June), to pray for the nation to know Jesus Christ. It is a time to seek the empowering of the Holy Spirit, that we may be effective witnesses to Jesus Christ.

Praying for others to know Jesus is one of the most powerful things we can do. Persistent prayer for others brings transformation to their lives. As Paul writes: '*Devote yourselves* to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should.' (Colossians 4: 2-4).

As Paul says, consistent praying for others involves discipline (*'be devoted'*) and responding to what God is already doing in people's lives (*'being watchful and thankful'*). We can pray for *'open doors'* to point people to Jesus and what He can mean in their lives. We all have opportunities to do this, as even Paul prayed as a prisoner in chains! Thy Kingdom Come encourages us to choose five people who we can pray for regularly. Why not ask God to guide you, as you settle on five names and commit to praying for them daily, perhaps by using the following prayer:

*Loving Father, in the face of Jesus Christ your light and glory have blazed forth.* 

Send your Holy Spirit that I may share with my friends the life of your Son and your love for all.

Strengthen me as a witness to that love as I pledge to pray for them, for your name's sake. Amen.'


# Life at St George's

This month I bring news of the death of 3 people with connections to St George's.

Firstly, our thoughts and prayers are with Peter Brown and his family in the loss of his mother at the age of 94. As she had lived in Clacton, we had not been able to meet her, and only knew of her through Peter. Her funeral takes place in the Clacton district on 30th April.

Secondly, our thoughts and prayers are with Graham on the loss of his mother, May Redwood. Some years ago, they used to be regular attendees at our morning service and later attended our 6.30pm Evensong, while it was running. During the last few years they attended St Andrew's but it is always good to see Graham when he is able to come along to St George's. Her funeral was on 31st March at South Essex crematorium.

Lastly, our thoughts and prayers are with the family of erstwhile councilor John Mylod. Although not a member of our church, he first came along to our St George's day Patronal service as the current mayor and he kept coming back year after year because he always looked forward to this special event and often mentioned it in the Hornchurch Residents' Association Focus magazine. He had also been invited to give talks at our former Women's' Fellowship. Regardless of our political persuasion, he was a good friend to our church. His funeral took place on 10th April at St Joseph's Roman Catholic Church in Upminster.

#### Outreach Saturday 5th April 2025 North Street Hall and across Hornchurch. Three reports.

It was our community's concern and love for those who have yet to encounter the family of the church in Hornchurch which led Christine Withers to encourage us to be bold and take the church to the town. On Saturday 5th April, about 27 volunteers from our churches gathered in North St. Hall to pray for God's blessing on our outreach into the town centre.

From there, several groups of three went out and around, armed with invitations to the Easter services and activities of St Andrew's, St George's, and St Matthew's, as well as Holy Cross and All Saints, Ardleigh Green. Reactions, of course, were varied when they were 'politely offered ' an invitation. But who knows how God will use those meetings, at some time in the lives of those we encounter. Back at the hall, a mixture of people arrived, responding to the invitation, and were able to have a cuppa and cake and a chat with church members, who had given up their precious time to share with our visitors and to cater for their physical needs!

All sorts came. From those searching for meaning, or looking for activities for their children, to those new to the area, and some with problems in their lives. We had people of other faiths and even an atheist or two, sympathetic to the Christian way of life. Messy Church and the Bridge were two points of interest. Children who were present were able to amuse themselves with playdough (and cake, of course!) But also, to remind us that we need to help the next generation to grow in knowledge and understanding of what can bring them good and fulfilling lives. On the whole, a good start to the renewal of our outreach into the community around us. But this has been a reminder that in this area, we, who are witnesses, must be more of a visible presence. For if we stay within our walls, how can people learn about this God Who loves them, and so be able to seek Him themselves?

It was good to be joined by Revd Julian Patching and other members of Holy Cross congregation, now joined with St Andrew's. A real show of unity amongst the churches.

I spoke briefly with several people on Saturday morning, but had much deeper conversations with three people.

First a delightful Sikh lady who lives in Ilford and had seen the event advertised so decided to come along. As part of my ordination training I had visited a Gurdwara (Sikh place of worship) in Ilford to learn about the Sikh religion and all they do to support the community. So we had a long conversation about our respective religions, as well as family values, grandchildren and the state of the world. The conversation felt a special time of sharing and we parted with the Hindu gesture - 'Namaste' which roughly translates to the divine in me recognises the divine in you. The next lady I spoke with said she wasn't a church goer but did have lots of friends who went to church and she would go with them if they asked her to. She said she'd often seen the Alpha Course advertised and wondered about going to that. I suggested she may like to try out the Bridge, as it was just a very friendly group of people which she may feel at home in. She did mention she had decide to go to St Andrew's for a 6.30pm service but found only a small handful of people, where she had imagine there would be lots of people. This provoked the comment that if someone had gone there for the first time they wouldn't have bothered to return. However, we discussed that St. Andrew's has many different services, so it would be much better to try out a few different services, at different times of the day, before making judgement. I was very grateful we had cards with the Easter services clearly printed on them to give out. The final lady that left an impression on me had frequented various services over the years including the Dementia Friendly service and in more recent years The Well. The

question I always ask myself is ... "are

we doing enough to show the Love of God to someone who doesn't feel they quite fit in in the church services we offer?"

Psalm 139:14 highlights that everyone is 'fearfully and wonderfully made' emphasising individuality and divine intention.

Romans 12:4-5 speaks about unity in diversity, likening believers to parts of the body, each with a unique role. - Are we doing enough?

The place that St Andrew's holds in the heart was a theme; several people who commented that St Andrew's is part of them as they were married there and one lady made her confirmation there. She did say she is a little disillusioned with the Church of England and also that she would like to see our services advertised on Facebook.

Someone said they were pleased to see us all out.

We had the sense that Hornchurch High Street and shops etc are blessed by God; it is a God/good place and one gentleman shared his desire to move here from Newham. I felt that he needed to tell someone a little bit about his life and family and we listened.

One gentleman said he should not take the service card as he is 'bad', I told him that he is not 'bad'. He described why he feels he is bad and I said that only God is good and he loves us all, as we are. He took the card.

One of the leaders from the Baptist church (Alison) encouraged us and we had fellowship with her. One gentleman asked if St Andrew's is a Church of England church and seemed interested in the services.

# Church opening for private prayer and reflection

St Andrew's church is currently open for private prayer and reflection two days a week. This is a short trial for three months, which started in February and which if satisfactory we hope to continue.

At the moment the church will be open on Thursday mornings from 11 am (ie immediately after mid-week Holy Communion at 10am) until 1pm, and on Tuesdays from 10am until 12 noon, unless the church is needed for a funeral or other service.

Two volunteer stewards will be in attendance for each session.

Come, sit, light a candle, pray, reflect and find peace

Charity of the Month  $\sim$  May and June 2025 First Step

First Step is a small charity based in Havering, which is recognised as a highly professional, specialised, experienced and caring Family Support organisation, working with families of babies and young children with special needs and/or disabilities. For over 36 years, families have contacted First Step at a moment of crisis and uncertainty, normally prediagnosis, fearing all is not well with their child. Sometimes they are struggling to be listened to by medical professionals, feeling overwhelmed with the implications of supporting a child with special needs and can often feel isolated.

Families can be referred by professionals or contact us directly. A family focus group recently highlighted how crucial the initial emotional and practical support provided was, as there is little other assistance available to them. In the words of Andrea, mum of Andrew: "there's no support anywhere else like it"

At First Step, we offer support through Family Support Groups, which meet on a weekly basis for a session in the morning or afternoon during school term time, with additional Holiday sessions spread over the year that siblings under 8 can also attend.



Whilst a lot of our work is facilitated through the Family Support Groups, additional one to one work is carried out by our Senior workers to address the specific needs of individual families, and to assist in the preparation for application for Disability Living Allowance (DLA) which can be a daunting task. Families tell us that the support they receive from First Step contributes to an overall improvement to their mental health and wellbeing for the whole family. Their child with needs is more able to convey their wants and needs, reducing anxiety, frustration and meltdowns. Parents tell us they

feel more in control of life improving their own anxiety and worry and life for the whole family is then improved. First Step is entirely dependent on donations and fundraising to support the work of the charity and we appreciate the support of the wider community to help fund the work with families of children with special needs and disabilities.

#### St James the Least of All

On why people should ALWAYS sit in the same pew . . .

My dear Nephew Darren

I have to say that the couple who complained that you never noticed they had been missing from church for a month had a point. There is a simple way of noticing when someone is absent: everyone sits in the same pew. Every Sunday. Always.

Little Miss Margison sits in the pew after the third pillar on the right here at St James the Least. As she walks up the aisle, you can sense her counting the pillars until she reaches the right one, which then allows her to sit in front of it. I have speculated that, if I ever had that pillar removed, then the following Sunday she would have a complete mental collapse.

One Sunday a visiting family arrived early and sat down; three people in an empty church seating 200. Colonel Wainwright and his wife were the first of our regulars to arrive and froze in horror. The Colonel said in a deafening whisper to his wife: "There's someone sitting in our pew."

At least they had the grace – no matter how reluctant – for one week, to sit somewhere else. Unlike the Prentice family of husband, wife and three children, who arrived to discover that a visiting family of husband, wife and four children were sitting in their pew; six people in a pew that held eight. Or, it normally holds eight. That Sunday, it held thirteen.

We at least have one iconoclast in Miss Pemberton, who makes a point of sitting in a different place every week. This thoroughly unsettles the rest of the congregation, who fear she may sit in their seats during her nomadic wanderings. I sometimes wonder if she has a chart at home with all the pew spaces marked on it and she strikes one off each week as she returns home after Mattins.

Occasionally the unexpected can happen. Mrs Cholmondeley arrived one week in good time, settled herself in her accustomed place, but halfway through the Service suddenly ran out of the building. Ten minutes later, she was back and in her usual place once again. It was only when the church filled with the smell of burned bacon that we understood.


That is why replacing pews with chairs in your church was a mistake. Pews can never be moved. You know where everybody is – or should be!



We recommend layers that can get mucky including long sleeves and trousers to protect against scratches and stings, waterproofs and boots, trainers, or wellies. #### Brentwood Museum ~ Another good afternoon out

A place for an interesting afternoon out not far from Hornchurch does not seem to be widely known locally. Brentwood Museum is now open for the summer season; the first Saturday, Sunday and Monday of every month from 2.30 pm to 4.30 on Saturday and Sunday, 10.30 to 12.30 on Mondays. Next open on 3rd May, last day Monday 6th October.

I went on the first open day in early April.

The museum is in Lorne Road Warley CM14 5HH situated at the entrance of Lorne Road cemetery and nature reserve. Their premises used to be the home of the Sexton and family. There are three main rooms, the entrance lobby, and the sunken garden. One room is of Brentwood history which includes information about the Essex Regiment (now part of the Royal Anglians) who had their garrison on Warley Common. The next room is best described as domestic history. They call it 'things your grandmother threw away'. I recognized quite a lot of artifacts (I still own something similar.)

The lobby has an exhibition of toys and information on the graves outside, about which more later.

The final room is the annual exhibition. This year is Food Glorious Food (picture middle right) The sunken garden has large outdoor exhibits including the bell wheel from St Thomas' Church. The cemetery has over 40 Commonwealth War graves, the majority of men of the Irish Guards who were barrack guests of the Essex Regiment during WWI.


Two other notable graves are Sergeant James Owens VC and his wife and other family. He died in 1901 and my first thought was Boer War. But as a young man he was one of the earliest recipients (1856) of the new Victoria Cross award for gallantry and conspicuous bravery in the presence of the enemy. In 1854 during the siege of Sevastopol he saved the life of his commanding officer. After retirement from the army he later became a Yeoman Warder at the Tower of London. He and his wife raised their family in Brentwood and he died in the Victoria Hospital in Romford.

The other grave (top right) a few yards away is of PC George William Gutteridge and his family. PC Gutteridge was on night duty one night in September 1927 when he stopped to question a suspicious looking car. His suspicions were correct; the car was stolen and contained a pair of armed criminals Frederick Guy Browne and William Kennedy who shot and murdered him. When eventually arrested Kennedy (who had fled home to Liverpool) tried to shoot the arresting officer but the gun jammed. Two things are historic about the case. Browne and Kennedy were the first convictions secured by ballistics technology. They were sentenced to hang.

The second feature is this. PC Gutteridge's body was found by a local garage owner. He raised the alarm but his attempts to contact the police were delayed by his being told he had telephoned the wrong station for anything to do with PC Gutteridge as he was not stationed in Romford but to phone Ongar instead. The operator required him to pay 2d first; during the ensuing argument the Postmistress had to intervene. The result was the beginning of the 999 system of free calls to the Emergency Services and blue Police boxes for members of those services The museum (bottom right) is run by volunteers and entrance is free and well worth a decent donation. There is also parking on a grassy path at the

edge of the cemetery. The cemetery is open on foot during reasonable daylight hours via a gate by the War Memorial. During the winter season a programme of talks is usually run on third Thursday evenings in Shenfield Parish Hall. I recommend a visit.

#### Life in Myanga

The 'dry season' has finally passed in Myanga but although the rainy season has now arrived, some crops still have to be sown and then the wait begins for them to grow. Sister Regginah wrote at the beginning of April "Here the financial situation is terrible and people are really struggling. So people have been coming now, the majority of them for seeds and fertiliser." It seems that seeds companies aren't rich enough, so they have developed 'Suicide or Terminator Seeds' so that now, poor people around the world have to buy seeds every year. Because the scientists have made their seeds 'sterile', they can only be used once, and then they die. In Myanga, most people have to eat the food that they grow because they can't afford to buy food. Now it is costing them a lot more to do that ! They are experiencing the same price rises as we are and people are starving. The sisters have been using some of the money we raised at the last Quiz Night for Kenya to give food to the Red Cross charity, who liaise with the local village chiefs to feed those most in need. In the past they would buy sacks of seeds and grain to give out to those in need, but once the word spread that these women are giving out free food; it became too dangerous.

Meanwhile, we are still helping the young people with their school fees and doing as much as we can. I'm hoping to hold another Cake Sale for Kenya soon, but until then I am, as always, more than happy to pass on any cash, cheques or small change given to me, so that the Poor Clare Sisters can continue their good work. # **'Assisted Dying' Bill fails to protect the vulnerable, Bishop of London warns**

The Bishop of London has warned of the 'serious risk' that people would opt for 'assisted dying' because they felt they were a burden. She said the risks of this happening would be multiplied by the pressures on the NHS and social care – if the Terminally Ill Adults (End of Life) Bill comes into force in England and Wales.

In a recent submission to the Terminally Ill Adults Bill Committee, Bishop Sarah Mullally, a former Chief Nursing Officer, says there are no measures in the proposed legislation nor are there safeguards that could prevent people opting for assisted suicide because they felt a burden, should the Bill come into force.

Evidence from Oregon and Washington State in the US and Canada where 'assisted dying' is legal shows between 43 per cent and 59 per cent of the people who opted to die by assisted suicide reported feeling a burden, she says.

The danger of this happening in the UK would be exacerbated by the pressures on adult social care, in which people increasingly pay for care, she says, and the long-term challenges facing the NHS and palliative care.

'The Church of England's opposition to the Terminally Ill Adults Bill is rooted in the impact the Bill would have on the most vulnerable members of society," she

says. "This is a concern shared by people of many different faiths as well as people with no faith." She adds: "The irreducible value of every human person means that no one is a burden, every life is precious, every life is worthy of care. No one should feel compelled to hasten their own death.

"For centuries this has been an unquestioned societal assumption, acting as a bedrock for social and relational flourishing.

"During the last year it has been particularly concerning to see some high-profile social commentators argue that feeling like a burden is actually an appropriate reason to pursue assisted suicide.
