A Time for Every Season

As we step into June, we find ourselves at a moment of change. According to the meteorological calendar, summer begins on the first of June—bringing with it longer days, warmer air, and a sense of new energy. This year, the transition feels particularly striking, with spring having already delivered record-breaking warmth.

And yet, this seasonal change is nothing new. The world turns, flowers bloom, fruit ripens, and then the leaves eventually fall. Nature moves to a rhythm set in motion long before any of Change can be uncomfortable, but it is us walked the earth. As Ecclesiastes 3 reminds us:

"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens.

These verses are poetic. They speak of the reality that life is full of seasons not just weather-wise, but emotionally, spiritually, and communally. There are times for joy and times for sadness. Times to begin, and times to let go. And most importantly, God is present in Revd Mark Smeed them all.

Many of us don't find change easy. Even good change can feel unsettling. A child finishing school. A friend moving house. The ending of a role. A new responsibility. We can feel unsteady when the familiar gives way to the unknown.

But perhaps the wisdom of Ecclesiastes is this: we are not meant to hold on to one season forever. Each one brings its own purpose and blessing. Scripture tells us that "God changes times and seasons" (Daniel 2:21), and we can

trust that He knows what each moment is for-even if we don't yet see it clearly.

So as summer begins, perhaps we can ask ourselves:

- What season am I in, personally or spiritually?
- What is God doing in me, right now-not in the past, or the future, but in this present moment?
- Is there something to let go of... or something new to embrace?

also often where God is most active. As one chapter ends and another beginswhether in nature, in the church, or in our own hearts-may we find peace in knowing that our unchanging God holds every season in His hands.

Child Sponsorship through World Vision

A number of years ago the congregation at St Matthew's Church decided that they would like to Sponsor a child in various countries around the world. At the monthly Café-style service a collection was taken and prayers said specifically for the child and family, past and present, and this paid for the sponsorship. Over the years many children have benefited from this generous support from the congregation.

In the early 2000s St Matthew's hosted a World Vision celebration lunch attended by a speaker from World Vision and it was notable how many parish families also sponsored a child of their own. Photographs and letters were passed round with joy. At that time St Matthew's sponsored a small boy called Damiawe, also from West Africa. As the numbers of the congregation sadly reduced during that period (but are recovering) the PCC took on paying monthly for the sponsorship. World Vision has always suggested who needed the most help and kept us up to date with their progress. The last child, Mustapha, has been receiving our help for four years. It has changed his life with hope and encouragement and given him life essentials and skills needed for the future. Now Mustapha is in a better position and, although he has moved away with his relatives, this is opening up better opportunities for him. We send him all our good wishes for his future. World Vision has come to us suggesting we sponsor Morie, which

suggesting we sponsor Morie, which we began this April. Morie is 2 years old and lives in Imperi in southern Sierra Leone close to the coast. His



full name is Morie Kongbako, his birthday is 27th April. Morie lives with his parents, both of whom are self-employed. Morie attends preschool and enjoys drawing and loves to play. By taking on this sponsorship we hope to provide Morie with a better life as many of the children of this area suffer from malnutrition and are afraid as they suffer abuse so need education and protection. As Morie grows and things change for him we will bring more news so that you can see where the PCC sponsorship is used.

Charity of the Month ~ May and June 2025 First Step

First Step is a small charity based in Havering, which is recognised as a highly professional, specialised, experienced and caring Family Support organisation, working with families of babies and young children with special needs and/or disabilities. For over 36 years, families have contacted First Step at a moment of crisis and uncertainty, normally prediagnosis, fearing all is not well with their child. Sometimes they are struggling to be listened to by medical professionals, feeling overwhelmed with the implications of supporting a child with special needs and can often feel isolated. Families can be referred by professionals or contact us directly. A family focus group recently highlighted how crucial the initial emotional and practical support provided was, as there is little other assistance available to them. In the words of Andrea, mum of Andrew: "there's no support anywhere else like it"

At First Step, we offer support through Family Support Groups, which meet on a weekly basis for a session in the morning or afternoon during school term time, with additional Holiday sessions spread over the year that siblings under 8 can also attend.




Whilst a lot of our work is facilitated through the Family Support Groups, additional one to one work is carried out by our Senior workers to address the specific needs of individual families, and to assist in the preparation for application for Disability Living Allowance (DLA) which can be a daunting task. Families tell us that the support they receive from First Step contributes to an overall improvement to their mental health and wellbeing for the whole family. Their child with needs is more able to convey their wants and needs, reducing anxiety, frustration and meltdowns. Parents tell us they feel more in control of life, improving

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Bell Ringing for the 80th Anniversary of VE Dav

Thursday 8th May 2025 was the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe Day (VE Day). Hitler had already committed suicide and the German forces surrendered on 7th May 1945 after nearly 6 years of war. This led to peace in Europe and many people took to the streets to erect British flags and light bonfires. Winston Churchill declared 8th May 1945 a national holiday. Many hosted street parties and a crowd of 100,000 people gathered outside Buckingham Palace and The Mall.

During the war, bell ringing was banned from June 1940. The ban was lifted in 1943 and there were enough bell ringers to ring on VE Day 1945. This tradition has continued over the year's with all major milestones celebrated with the ringing of bells. The 80th anniversary, however, was the last major milestone where a number of WW2 veterans were still alive to share their memories. This gave significant importance to the occasion and at St Andrew's we joined other ringers around the country to ring the bells on 8th May 2025 at 6.30pm.

Prophecy can be used for direction in Jobs, Careers etc and Is not just about the intellect or decision-making processes. St Paul says 'Hold fast to all which is good' I These 5 v 20+21. The definition of a Prophet is revealed in Revelation I v 6, The New Testament is Full of The Prophecies of Jesus Christ, As Jesus has fulfilled every Prophecy of the coming Messiah. The Book of Revelation is Full of Prophecy and the end times!

Another Grand Day Out

Last month I recommended Brentwood Museum as a good afternoon out. During the May Day bank holiday we went further afield to the WWI aerodrome at Stow Maries. The aerodrome opened in 1916 as home to B Flight of No 37(HD) Squadron, Royal Flying Corps, like our own Suttons Farm, in response to the German aerial threat to London and the South East.

It is the most complete WWI era aerodrome in the country; it must be remembered that some aerodromes continued in use, or were



Stow Maries and parts of others to view in the hangars. The ones capable of flight are replicas but there are original parts of machines now over 100 years old. Restoration and conservation work is in progress and the techniques and

craftsmanship are fascinating. Left is one of the original hangars showing the variety of machinery to be seen.

We were very lucky that two of the replica machines were undergoing their licence tests for the summer season that day, and part of the testing process included test flights. We saw the German Albatros DVa in the colours of Leutnant Paul Baeumer and his edelweiss emblem (above left). And a French Neiuport (I forget which marque) which was flown by the RFC, plus the French Air force and the United States Army Air Service (predecessor of the USAF) There is a good café and shop. The airfield is dog friendly (well behaved of course) and the presence of the WWI station cat remains through his/ her paw prints in the concrete floor of the café toilets and its photograph in the exhibition with Captain Albert Fanstone who was noted for his fondness for dogs and cats. The

Wings and Wags dog show doesn't seem to be on during 2025, but other events are; look up the website at this address

These two young men of 10th Essex (left) were teaching each other semaphore. They were startled not just to know that I remember a few letters, but that I was taught it in the Brownies, this being considered a useful skill for 8 year old girls in 1962. The aerodrome is open most Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays until December

2025 unless closed for a special event (check before you leave) but not Bank Holiday Mondays or Saturday 14th June 2015. The address is Hackmans Lane Purleigh Chelmsford Essex.

recommissioned after 10-15 years (as happened at Suttons Farm) and thus their facilities were updated again and again. Stow Maries ceased operating in 1919 and reverted to Flambards Farm with the buildings used as barns.

However, because from the air it continued to look like an airfield, it was bombed during WWII and also received emergency landings from at least one damaged Hurricane. It was not an official decoy airfield. In 1997 the site was

surveyed by the Royal Commission for Historical Monuments in England who found evidence of the existence of 47 buildings, half of which have either survived completely or sufficiently to be restored effectively. They now have Grade II listed status. Since 2009 Air history enthusiasts have been maintaining the airfield as a military aviation museum and a working aerodrome. The day we visited the Living History



group the 10th Essex Regiment were in attendance. They were re-enacting life in the Royal Flying Corp. The RFC was the air arm of the Army until 1st April 1918 when it merged with the Royal Naval Air Service (RNAS) to form the RAF we know today. The 10th Essex also included some navy personnel in that day's re-enactment to show the inter service cooperation.

There are several aeroplanes based at




