Active Remembrance



November begins with the celebration of All Saints on 1st November. Ten days later we come to Remembrance Day. It is a time that invites us to look back at people and events of the past and

reflect on their influence on our life today. I love the imagery at the beginning of Hebrews 12

"1Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a huge crowd of witnesses to the life of faith, let us strip off every weight that slows us down, especially the sin that so easily trips us up. And let us run with endurance the race God has set before us. We do this by keeping our eyes on Jesus, the champion who initiates and perfects our faith. Because of the joy awaiting Him, He endured the cross, disregarding its shame. Now He is seated in the place of honour beside God's throne." (NLT)

Looking at the lives of people of faith I can feel overwhelmed by the things they endure to share God's love and totally inadequate to the task. I feel the same way considering the millions of people who fight to protect the rights and freedom of others. Because one thing that doesn't change with the decades and centuries is the need to keep standing up for the values of God's kingdom: justice, peace, love. It is a battle: sometimes physical, sometimes emotional, sometimes psychological, often all three. We need to believe firmly in what we are campaigning for to be able to endure.

Every year when we gather to remember those who died in conflict, we remember also those whose lives were changed forever and whose personal struggles continue. Every year when we fall silent for two minutes, it is in the knowledge that somewhere in the world conflict continues and more people are suffering and dying. In our silence we feel sorrow and compassion. Maybe it is also a time to recommit ourselves to running that difficult race that is following Jesus and serving God. Jesus died so that we might be forgiven and draw closer to God. Following Jesus



means fighting to get free of the things that hold us back from serving God in love and gratitude for all He offers, and then helping others to do the same.

I don't believe God will ask us to run someone else's race, but I am sure He will equip us to run our race. We can look at how Jesus ran His race and then apply that to whatever God has for us. We don't know what it will cost us, but we do know that it will be challenging because standing up for mercy, justice and peace upsets the way the world is. We can give thanks for everyone who has already challenged the ways of the world and commit to playing our part in bringing in God's kingdom. God has done so much for us, in gratitude we can help others discover that too. The more of us working together and cheering each other on the easier the race will become.

For over 115 years, CBM has been transforming lives around the world. We work with local partners, making sure people with disabilities in some of the world's poorest communities have access to healthcare, education and a future where they can thrive.

CBM was founded in 1908 by German Pastor Ernst Christoffel and it has been transforming the lives of people ever since. It was travelling through Turkey and seeing children who could not see, walk or hear that made him want to do something about it and so CBM was formed. A home was set up in Malatia Turkey to provide care and education for children with disabilities.

Over the years the work has expanded into Africa and Asia where CBM strives for justice for all people with disabilities. The charity is rooted in Christian values. No matter where they live in the world, all people with disabilities should have access to healthcare, education and the opportunity to earn a living. Like Chandrakala, 32, who wanted to be a beautician but because of her disability she could not get the training. Now with the help of local partners DECN futuremakers have given her the chance. Now Chandrakala has her own business and with their help she was able to fulfil her dreams.

The Holy Spirit and You







Romford's Garden Suburb: the origins of Gidea Park

Last month we ended here. Perversely, the elegant magnificence of Gidea Hall became a disadvantage during the nineteenth century.

We continue now ~ "Converted into one residence it would be one of the finest in Essex," the 1893 auctioneer optimistically claimed. Unfortunately, any millionaire who could afford to buy such an impressive residence was unlikely to wish to live alongside one of the busiest main roads in Essex and so close to the growing town of Romford. The foundation of the town's prosperity was its weekly cattle market, and the high road that passed the gates of Gidea Hall was congested with drovers and their herds, although some of this traffic was transferred to the railway from the eighteen-forties. In 1801, the extensive parish of Romford had counted a population of 3,179, of whom perhaps slightly more than two thousand lived in the town itself barely fifty percent more than in late-Tudor times. By 1841, the parish contained 5,317 people, suggesting that the town itself had doubled in size. The arrival of the railway two

years earlier had not only emphasised years later, the parish had a its existing position as an important local market centre, but encouraged the development of a major enterprise that would become synonymous with Romford. In 1845, Edward Ind's local brewery acquired new investment to become Ind, Coope & Co., which operated on an industrial scale: within a couple of years, it was exporting its branded Romford Ale as far away as Australia. By 1908, 450 workers were employed at the brewery complex, which occupied most of the ground between the High Street and the Great Eastern railway line, to which it was connected by a network of sidings. In earlier centuries, the owners of Gidea Hall had been able to dominate the small community located so close to their gates, but this ceased to be possible by the middle of the nineteenth century. Not only was the mansion itself no longer home to a powerful landed family but Romford gradually acquired its own institutions. In 1851, a Local Board of Health was established for the immediate area of the town. Thirty

population of 9,050 people, of whom 7,176 lived in the Local Board district. Local government reform in 1894 upgraded the Board into an Urban District Council, with greater powers and broader ambitions. By the time of the 1901 census, the parish – now shorn of the outlying districts of Havering village and Noak Hill – recorded 13,915 people, pointing to an urban population well over ten thousand. Romford was certainly not a particularly turbulent town. Although prevailing westerly winds probably wafted the unmistakable smells of the brewery as far as Gidea Hall, it is unlikely that Romford was any dirtier or less healthy than other contemporary small urban centres. But its growing size, its administrative autonomy and its increasing proximity – with residential development moving eastward from 1855 - made it a less-than-ideal neighbour for any would-be lord of the manor.

A heartfelt thank you to St Matthew's Church for providing a safe, welcoming space where young people can continue to grow, express themselves, and thrive through the power of theatre.

Persecuted Christians – the story of what one woman in Nigeria faced

Asabe's life was turned upside down and devastated in one appalling, never-to-be-forgotten night earlier this year.

The Nigerian wife and mother's home was viciously attacked by Fulani Islamists, who slaughtered one of her sons and set fire to their house, killing other family members in the process.

In total, more than 50 men, women and children were killed in the evening attack on Zike village in Nigeria's Plateau State. The Fulani raiders were armed with guns and machetes.

Asabe's home was one of the first to be targeted. The family was awoken by gunshots. The attackers forced their way into the home, dragged Asabe's 14-year-old son Jerry outside and, in Asabe's words, 'killed him like a goat.'

They then ransacked the house, before setting fire to it—with the rest of the family still inside. As the fire took hold, Asabe tried to stop her six-year-old daughter Joanne from crying, fearful as she was that the militants would return and kill them all.

But then, as they were trapped inside and the heat of the blaze became unbearable, she encouraged her daughter to cry, reasoning that if the attackers returned and killed them it would be a quicker, less painful death. Thankfully, other villagers heard the cries and came to the rescue.

Asabe's husband, Moses, was taken to hospital, but later died from his burn injuries. Their ten-year-old son James was another victim, having died in the fire. Asabe's mother-in-law Talatu has been left with badly burned hands.

Many other Christian communities have suffered this year in violent raids by Islamist Fulani herdsmen. Release International partners have been aiding Asabe and what remains of her family, providing practical and medical care. "I want to say thank you and God bless you," Asabe said, when Release International staff and Nigerian partners met her recently. Mum and daughter continue to wear protective coverings over burns on their arms.

After the attack, one of Release International's partners in Nigeria conducted a funeral service for 51 victims, who were buried in a mass grave just outside the village. Other Release International partners have provided food and essentials packs to the struggling, grieving families.


